Personal Data Privacy Policy of Hong Kong Anti-Doping Committee

In order to fulfill the obligation of running an anti-doping programme in compliance with the World Anti-Doping Code. Hong Kong Anti-Doping Committee (HKADC) will have to collect and process extensive personal data from the athletes in order to ensure an effective anti-doping programme for detection, deterrence and prevention of doping.

(A) Practice in processing the personal data

- To ensure that personal information processed in connection with anti-doping activities is protected as required by data protection laws, principles and standards, WADA has enforced the 'International Standard for the Protection of Privacy and Personal Information' since 1 January 2009. This document can be downloaded from http://www.wada-ama.org. As a signatory of the World Anti-Doping Code, HKADC will process the personal data strictly according to the Standard.
- Personal data of athletes are also processed in a way that fully complies with the local laws, namely the Personal Data (Privacy) Ordinance (Cap. 486). Specifically all procedures adopted are in adherence to the six data protection principles as laid down in the Ordinance.
- 3 Reasonable security measures have been imposed in the processing and storage of athletes' data by HKADC.

(B) Measures to protect athletes' right in relation to personal data

- 4 Written consent/declaration from athletes will be obtained when they provide personal data to HKADC. There are at least three situations under which athletes will need to submit personal information to HKADC.
 - a) Using the Anti-Doping Administration and Management System (ADAMS) to submit whereabouts information
 - b) Completing the Doping Control Form when providing samples for doping control.
 - c) Submitting application for Therapeutic Use Exemption

The corresponding consent/declaration has been modified from templates provided by WADA. The information as provided in the consent/declaration has been checked against the data protection principles mentioned in the Personal Data (Privacy) Ordinance. The manner of data collection and data processing complies with these data protection principles.
